Auditor's Report Gives Good Marks to KPUD

Klickitat PUD's 2003 audit was "clean and successful," says Jim Moss, KPUD's chief accountant.

The district received the published report from the Washington State Auditors Office January 28. State auditors from the Yakima office reviewed the results of the examination with KPUD staff.

The audit evaluated the district's accountability concerning safeguarding of public resources, compliance with state laws and regulations, and presentation of financial statements.

KPUD was shown to have complied with state laws and regula-

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tions, as well as its own policies and procedures in the areas included within the scope of the audit.

The report said internal control procedures were adequate to safeguard public assets. Financial statements were presented fairly, in all

material respects.

The audit determined the district resolved the two issues from the 2002 audit regarding accurate and timely cash reconciliation and adjusting entries, along with detailed receipts being required for all travel expenditures. These issues were followed up during the current audit period, and both items are being handled appropriately.
